PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dr. Corcoran reported today marked the first day of classes for the spring semester and he was pleased with the way everything ran so smoothly. Everyone seemed to know where they needed to go without any problems. He believes this can be attributed to recent attendance at the new student orientation programs, facilitated by Quintin Overocker and Aseret Loveland under the direction of Mark Grzybowski. Despite the weather not always being ideal when holding these sessions, turnout has been terrific, so kudos to Quintin and Aseret on a job well done. The work that has been done so far by the College's agriculture program-expansion steering committee is very impressive. Every meeting with the large group has been positive and productive. Dr. Corcoran is very happy that Trustee Laurie Bonucci is a member and key contributor to the discussions. Special recognition was given to Reed Wilson for working so closely with Jill Guynn and the University of Illinois Extension for making this project a priority. A summary of where things stand was prepared by Reed and distributed to every board member. Coincidentally, although the College has been fortunate to work closely with University of Illinois Extension and the College of ACES, Dr. Corcoran received calls in the last two days from Illinois State University and Southern Illinois University about their interest in also working with IVCC on transfer opportunities for our agriculture students. Dr. Corcoran is looking forward to discussing start-up costs for this initiative with the board's Audit/Finance Committee on February 1. Athletic Director Cory Tomasson reported recently that the Athletic Department's overall GPA for the fall semester was a very impressive 3.02. IVCC student athletes, coaches and support staff should be commended for a job well done. Dr. Corcoran hopes that board members who were able to arrive a bit early before the board meeting and checked out the student center and cyber café were impressed with the student-life space. As a reminder the official grand opening is scheduled for Tuesday, January 19th at 11 a.m. If board members were planning to attend, they were to let Jeanne or Dr. Corcoran know so that they will be properly recognized at this important event. Dr. Corcoran thanked the board members and foundation directors who were able to attend the staff holiday luncheon on December 18. Their presence and ongoing support means a lot to IVCC's hardworking employees.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Mr. Mallery reported the ICCTA Board of Representatives cancelled its February 2016 meeting held in conjunction with the ACCT NLS in Washington, D.C. and replaced it with an in-state board meeting via conference call at 10 a.m. on Saturday, January 23, 2016. ICCTA would like to know ahead of time how many representatives are planning to participate in the conference call.

PROPOSAL RESULTS – TRUCK DRIVER TRAINING TRACTOR AND TRAILER LEASE

It was moved by Dr. Driscoll and seconded by Mr. Mallery to approve the administration to enter into a 60-month lease with CIT Group Leasing, Inc. at \$3,470 per month plus a 14 cent per mile maintenance fee per vehicle for two (2) 2017 Volvo 630 tractors and a 60-month lease with PAL Trailer Leasing for two (2) 2016 Hyundai trailers at \$750 per month. Motion passed by voice vote.

ELIMINATION OF FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR THE ILLINOIS SMALL BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT CENTER (IL SBDC) AT THE END OF CALENDAR YEAR 2016

It was moved by Ms. Goetz and seconded by Dr. Huffman to discontinue IVCC's financial responsibilities for sponsoring SBDC state grants and allow the administration to facilitate the transition of the IL SBDC to another grantee at the end of calendar year 2016. Furthermore, the Board approved terminating the employment relationship with the director of the SBDC, Beverly Malooley, and Business Specialist, Gina Czubachowski, at the end of the calendar grant year, December 31, 2016. Motion passed by voice vote.

TRANSFER OF FUNDS FOR CLASSROOM TECHNOLOGY IMPROVEMENT

It was moved by Mr. Solon and seconded by Dr. Driscoll to transfer \$40,640 from the Auxiliary Enterprise Fund to the Education Fund for Classroom Technology Improvements. Motion passed by voice vote.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS - January 2016

Revenues

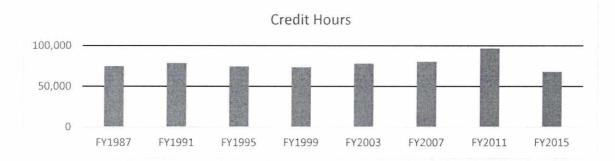
• As of January 29, the headcount for spring semester is 3,203, which is 171 students less than at the same point in time last year. Credit hours for spring 2016 decreased by 2,046, or 6.83 percent, for a total of 27,925, from this point in time one year ago. Total credit hours for the FY2016 budget were level with FY2015. It will take an additional 2,821 credit hours to make this goal. Registrations for the second eight weeks which begins on March 14 will put us closer to making the budgeted number of credit hours.

Historically, credit hours were very consistent 1987 through 2007. It is only in the last five years that we have seen highs and lows.



- Since the State has not adopted a FY2016 budget, there have been no payments for MAP (Monetary Award Program) grants, base operating grants or equalization grants for FY2016. The College has covered these expenditures with reserve funds. In the previous fiscal year as of January 31, 2015, the College had received \$1,959,025 from the State \$329,850 for MAP funding; \$106,546 for Adult Education, and the remainder for base operating grants. The Governor's Budget Address is scheduled for February 17. The primary election is scheduled for March 15.
- Pending before the LaSalle County Board of Review are 14 property tax appeals each asking for in excess of \$100,000 in reduction of assessed value. A reduction of more than \$3.5 million is being requested for all 14 properties. These hearings include O'Neal Metals asking for a reduction of \$530,000; Farm & Fleet asking for a reduction of \$466,000, and Con-way Freight asking for \$921,983.

Expenditures

College operations are continuing as normal despite no State budget. Some of the more significant variances in expenditures for the seven months ending January 31, 2016, include the following:

Fund 01 – Education Fund – Instruction – Fixed Charges – Ottawa Center annual rent payment of \$132,000; Truck Driver Training program truck and trailer rental of \$25,150;

Fund 01 – Education Fund – Academic Support – Contractual – library services - \$11,000; software renewals - \$47,850; Blackboard annual fee - \$75,000;

Fund 01 – Education Fund – Institutional Support – Contractual – legal services \$41,685; computer services from Burwood Group - \$70,850; Ellucian administrative software annual fees - \$220,750; marketing plan consultant - \$63,000; health insurance consultant – \$8,000;

Fund 02 – Operations & Maintenance Fund – Operations & Maintenance of Plant – Fixed Charges – includes \$61,053 annual property insurance premium;

Fund 06 – Restricted Fund – Instruction – Materials & Supplies – includes NAEYC dues of \$6,500, INAM grant purchases of \$19,700, and Inspire Illinois grant purchases of \$15,000;

Fund 12 – Liability, Protection & Settlement Fund – Institutional Support – Contractual Services – includes annual insurance consulting fee of \$4,950, background checks – \$5,577; tort-related legal expenses of \$8,900, Spring All-Staff presenter fee of \$8,000; \$10,325 in expenses connected with the June 2015 Truck Driver Training accident; and \$8,000 for training software for Title IX compliance;

Fund 12 – Liability, Protection & Settlement Fund – Institutional Support – Fixed Charges – includes liability insurance - \$58,035; workers' compensation insurance - \$131,643; and athletic insurance and claims of \$43,725.

Protection, Health & Safety Projects:

- Building A Air Handler/Chiller Replacement air handler and chiller are installed; continuing with controls and test and balance;
- Building B Air Handler/Chiller Replacement –pre bid meeting February 11; bid opening February 25; installation planned for winter 2016;
- Building D Air Handler/Chiller Replacement approved by ICCB with installation planned for winter 2017;
- Lecture Hall D225 Renovation construction bids submitted for approval; asbestos removal bids due February 11; completion scheduled for early August 2016.

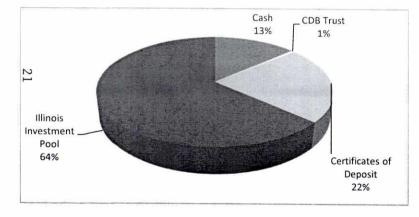

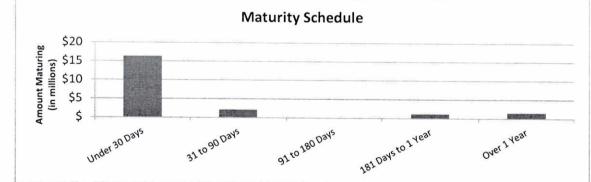

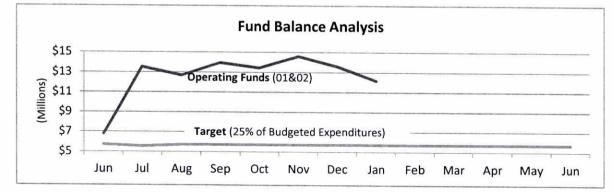

Tuition Adjustment

The administration recommends increasing tuition from \$111.60 to \$116.60 per credit hour to be effective with the summer 2016 semester. The universal fee would remain at \$7.40. The combined tuition and universal fee would be \$124.00. The increase of \$5.00 per credit hour is a 4.2 percent increase over the FY2016 combined tuition and universal fee of \$119.00.

The State average combined tuition and universal fee is \$124.13 for fiscal year 2016. For ICCB Peer Group III, which includes IVCC, the average FY2016 tuition and fees is \$115.61; for the super peer group which includes Peer Group III and other colleges similar in size and demographics to IVCC, the average FY2016 tuition and fees is \$119.75.

This action is being recommended with the anticipation of reduced State funding. The State's financial crisis has had a serious effect on many of community colleges where tuition increases of \$9 and \$10 per credit are being discussed.

Recommendation:

The administration recommends Board approval to increase tuition by \$5.00, from \$111.60 to \$116.60 per credit hour beginning with the summer 2016 semester.

KPI 5: Fiscal Responsibility/Affordability

Course Fees/Adjustments

Course fees are reviewed annually by Program Coordinators and Deans using the approved Course Fee Guidelines. A copy of the current course fee guidelines is attached, along with a copy of the proposed fee changes for FY17.

As per the Guidelines, courses taught in a dedicated instructional computer lab will have a technical support fee included in the final course fee. The FY17 fee included in those course fees has been increased from \$5.10 per credit hour in FY16 to \$5.50 in FY17.

All significant changes (more than a \$10 increase) have a brief rationale listed after the proposed fee.

Last year at this time there were 359 active courses with approved course fees. Due to curriculum cleanup, several courses have been eliminated (that had fees) which will no longer be offered. This will bring the total number of active courses with approved course fees to 358.

Recommendation:

The administration recommends changing 55 course fees: 49 increases, 4 decreases, one new course, plus the assignment of a course fee to one existing course, as presented in the attached document.

Course Fee Guidelines

Qualifying Expenses

Course fees may be charged in order to cover costs of the following.

Per course section

- 1. Consumable supplies
- 2. Printing (handouts of less than 10 pages)
- 3. Program or course-specific software and licenses, other than those applications in use by the general student body, such as Microsoft Office Products
- 4. Lab assistants for specific programs courses
- 5. Expert guest speakers

Per credit hour

6. Technical support of instructional computer labs

Per student

- 7. Special 3rd party or certification/licensure testing
- 8. Extra-ordinary instructional costs, such as per hour pay for private music lessons.

Expenses covered by grants or other external sources are not to be considered.

Calculation of Fees

(Expenses per course section) / (enrollments in all sections) + (Per credit hour expenses) X credit hours + (Per student expenses) Course Fee

- 1. Estimate the dollar amount to be spent on identified qualifying expenses, per course section, through review of past expenditures and consideration of anticipated variances.
- 2. Annualize irregular expenditures by dividing the total expense by the useful life of the supply, service, or license.
- 3. Sum all expenses.
- 4. Divide that amount by the number of students enrolled in all sections of the course (or those consuming the resource) for the previous year or the minimum number of students per section, whichever is larger.
- 5. Add in technical support for classes taught in instructional computer labs. The fee is calculated by ITS annually as the cost of support per computer lab PC divided by the average annual credit hours generated in instructional labs. The calculation does not include costs covered by student technology fees. The technical support element must be multiplied by the number of credit hours in the course.
- 6. Add special, per student fees, such as insurance, testing and criminal background checks at the actual anticipated rate per student.

The resulting figure, rounded to the next dollar, is the course fee to be assessed. The maximum increase in a course fee will not exceed 50% in a given year.

Review and Adjustment of Fees

Course fees should be reviewed annually by Program Coordinators and Deans.

Agriculture Program Instructor/Coordinator Position

Over the last six months, a 36-member agriculture program expansion Steering Committee has been formed to discuss and prioritize the challenges facing local agriculture and the role IVCC could play in meeting these challenges. The Steering Committee has broad representation from every sector of the IVCC District agriculture community, including main-line farmers, finance, business, education, small farms, Farm Bureau leadership, University of Illinois Extension specialists and more. High school agriculture instructors have served an especially-critical role in this fact-finding process by being the direct conduit to 600+ students enrolled in agriculture programs across the IVCC District. Local high schools should be commended for making the wise choice of investing in these forward-thinking agriculture program leaders who are doing such an excellent job of responding to the needs of the districts they each serve.

The response from the community to IVCC's efforts has been very encouraging and the impetus for moving forward with a plan of action. Along with the need for strengthening our transfer program for students who want to save money, earn scholarships and obtain a first-rate educational experience by attending IVCC first before transferring on seamlessly to a senior institution, there appears to be tremendous opportunity for new degree and certificate programming in the areas of precision agriculture, agricultural business and small farm operations.

Without question, the most commonly expressed theme expressed by members of the Steering Committee has been to need to hire an extraordinary individual who will build IVCC's program. The new agricultural instructor/program coordinator will need to have the academic credentials, vision and passion to lead the college's effort and be held accountable for program results.

The administration has shared its recommendation to the Board Audit/Finance Committee that this new position be included in the FY2017 Budget. The time has come for moving forward with posting, recruiting and selecting the best possible candidate for filling this key position at IVCC.

Recommendation:

Begin the process of recruiting candidates for the Agriculture Program Instructor/ Coordinator Position so that the college can build an exemplary agriculture program that meets the needs of the IVCC community.

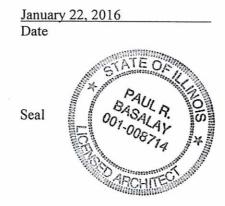
