CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

A continuation of GER 1001, designed to build on the fundamentals already learned and to foster development of the four essential skills of language acquisition: comprehension of spoken German, reading comprehension, speaking and writing. The student will develop, review and expand skills acquired through assigned study and will collaborate with other learners, write and participate in discussions.

Outcome 1 – Students will demonstrate pronunciation ability.

- Competency 1.1 Students will pronounce all vowels, including umlauted ones, correctly enough to be understood.
- Competency 1.2 Students will pronounce all consonants correctly enough to be understood.
- Competency 1.3 Students will be able to avoid most of the confusion between the sounds of German and English.
- Competency 1.4 Students will speak basic sentences and questions with the correct intonation and rhythm.
- Competency 1.5 Students will be able to read a simple text aloud with only a moderate number of errors.

Outcome 2 – Students will demonstrate speaking ability.

- Competency 2.1 Students will be able to make basic conversation about personal information and everyday topics in the present and past tenses.
- Competency 2.2 Students will be able to speak in basic sentences on key current events and comparative cultural topics.

Outcome 3 – Students will demonstrate listening ability.

- Competency 3.1 Students will be able to understand the basics of a native speaker's conversation on everyday topics and personal information, when clearly and deliberately spoken.
- Competency 3.2 Students will be able to understand the gist of a native speaker's comments on current events and cultural topics, when spoken distinctly and slowly.
- Competency 3.3 Students will be able to partially follow the general plot of audio or video that uses fairly simple language straightforwardly.

Outcome 4 – Students will demonstrate reading ability.

- Competency 4.1 Students will be able to comprehend basic written German dealing with everyday topics.
- Competency 4.2 Students will be able to use context to comprehend simple written material on current events and cultural topics.
- Competency 4.3 Students will be able to comprehend the general ideas of a literary work of moderate difficulty.

Outcome 5 – Students will demonstrate writing ability.

- Competency 5.1 Students will be able to write basic sentences in the present and past (perfect and imperfect) tenses about basic personal and everyday topics with only a moderate number of grammatical errors.
- Competency 5.2 Students will, with the aid of dictionary, be able to incorporate new words and expressions into their writing, so that they can comment on the main ideas in current events and cultural topics.

Outcome 6 – Students will demonstrate an awareness of some of the distinct features of the cultures of German-speaking countries.

- Competency 6.1 Students will be able to notice differences between some basic American customs and those of Germany, Austria, and Switzerland.
- Competency 6.2 Students will be able to apply cultural knowledge to major social contexts, e.g. the most obvious examples of when to use the formal or informal "you".
- Competency 6.3 Students will be able to trace some English language and cultural traits to the Germanic sources.

COURSE TOPICS AND CONTENT REQUIREMENTS:

GER 1001 and GER 1002 essentially cover the same topics and amount of material as a first-year German program at any other American college or university. This includes the building up of vocabulary, developing the four language skills (listening, speaking, reading, and writing), and learning about the various cultures connected to the language.

1. Basic principles of the grammar and structure of the German language, with oral and written exercises in a conversational context.
2. Culture of the German-speaking countries, with readings of topical prose selections.
3. Systematic pronunciation practice and oral/aural practice through listening to audio and video materials, as well as conducting dialogues.
4. Use of other media, including videos, films, online resources, etc.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS:

Instruction may either be offered in a traditional classroom format, with students meeting the time required for a Lecture course, or in a Blended format, which combines the traditional classroom setting with additional online instruction and/or practice. Class time will include a good deal of partner and small-group work, so that students can learn to use their language skills.

INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS:

There will be a required textbook for the course which comes with online access for additional resources offering detailed grammar explanations, drills, and practice; vocabulary flashcards and/or practice; video and audio segments; and enrichment activities. Several additional (optional) resources are offered in the bookstore, and the classroom has dictionaries and other supplementary materials to assist students.

STUDENT REQUIREMENTS AND METHODS OF EVALUATION:

1. Outside of class: Students will use textbook and online component, read assigned material, and prepare written and oral assignments.
2. In class: Students will participate actively in all oral and written exercises, conversations, and activities. They will be learn vocabulary and grammar.
3. Students will successfully complete all homework assignments, tests, etc.
4. Regular class attendance is advised, as it almost always increases class
